The seventy-ninth Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina assembled in Grace Church, Morganton, at 10 o'clock A. M. on Wednesday, the 15th day of May, A. D. 1895.

The Convention was called to order and prayers were offered by the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Secretary called the roll, and announced as present twenty-nine of the Clergy and Lay Delegates from seven Parishes.

A recess was then taken for Divine Service.

At 11 o'clock the Litany was said by the Rev. McNeely DuBose. The Bishop celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rev. Charles T. Bland and the Rev. Jarvis Buxton, D.D. The sermon was preached by the Rev. James A. Weston from the text, Philippians II, 12: "Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling."

The offerings of the congregation were given to the New York Bible and Common Prayer-Book Society.

At the conclusion of Divine Service the Bishop took the chair and the presence of Lay Delegates from two additional Parishes was noted.

In consequence of the absence of a quorum the Convention took a recess until 4 o'clock P. M.

WEDNESDAY, May 15, 4 P. M.

The Convention was called to order by the Bishop. The roll was called by the Secretary, and there were found to be present forty-one of the Clergy and Delegates from nineteen Parishes, whereupon the Bishop declared the Convention duly organized.

The Rev. Dr. Murdoch nominated as President of the Convention the Rev. M. M. Marshall, D.D. There being

no other nomination, the Secretary was, on motion, instructed to cast the vote of the Convention, and Dr. Marshall was declared elected.

The Rev. Dr. Sutton nominated as Secretary the Rev. Julian E. Ingle. There being no other nomination, the Chairman was, on motion, requested to cast the vote of the Convention, and he was declared elected.

The Secretary announced the appointment of Mr. G. C. Lamb, as Assistant Secretary.

On motion of Mr. R. H. Battle, it was

Resolved, That the daily sessions of the Convention shall begin with Morning Prayer at 9 o'clock, and that a recess shall be taken at 1 o'clock.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

The Finance Committee beg leave to report that they have examined the several accounts of the Treasurer and find them all correct, and that the several balances named in his report are on deposit in the Citizens National Bank of Raleigh. They also find that all the secureties specified on page 3 of Appendix C are in his hands, and are kept securely in a box lodged in the Citizens National Bank of Raleigh.

For further particulars attention is called to the annual statement of the Treasurer submitted herewith and marked Appendix C.

In consequence of the changes and fluctuations in the assessments for the past two or three years, the Committee have thought it best that the whole matter should be gone over in Convention, and offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the consideration of the assessments of the different Parishes for the Episcopal and Contingent Fund be made the order of the day for Thursday, 16th inst., at 10 o'clock A. M.

The resolution appended to the report was, on motion of the Rev. Dr. Sutton, adopted.

Mr. Paul B. Means presented the following report, which was, on his motion, ordered to lie on the table for future consideration:

The Special Committee, consisting of Rev. Dr. Wetmore and Messrs. John Wilkes and Paul B. Means, appointed at the last Diocesan Convention under the motion of Rev. Dr. Murdoch, as found on page 49 of the Journal of that Convention, respectfully report:

Journal of Proceedings.

That they met at the residence of Mr. John Wilkes, in Charlotte, on the 26th ult., and, after due consideration of the matter of record referred to them by the motion of Dr. Murdoch, resolved to report, and do hereby report, for favorable action and adoption by this Convention, the resolution found on page 49 aforesaid, and offered before the last Convention by Mr. Paul B. Means in the following words and figures:

"Resolved, That Chapter I, Canon VIII, Section 8, of the Canons of the Diocese be amended by inserting immediately after the semicolon next the word 'purposes' in the fourth line thereof, the following: But they shall report no such assessment on any Parish or organized Mission until they have notified the Clergy and Lay Delegates present from such Parish or organized Mission, at the time said report shall be made, what the assessment and its purpose shall be, so as to give such representatives of said Parish or organized Mission an opportunity to be heard thereon."

In view of the general range and tenor of the debate in the last Convention upon the foreging resolution offered by Mr. Means, and on account of some motions covering the general financial affairs of the Diocese made before that Convention in the nature of amendments and substitutes, but not recorded in the Journal for the reason, as we suppose, that they were not reduced to writing, and especially because of one motion, which we particularly remember as offered prior to and consequently embraced within the motion of Dr. Murdoch, by Mr. John Wilkes, to the effect that all assessments on Parishes and organized Missions should be on a basis of a sum certain upon each communicant of every Parish or Mission, this Committee deem their duties to embrace a somewhat general consideration of the assessments and finances of the Diocese and a report thereon.

Now, therefore, in accordance with this sense of their duty, this Committee resolved to and do hereby further report for the favorable action and adoption by this Convention the following:

1. Amend Chapter I, Canon VIII, Section 8, of the Canons of the Diocese by inserting immediately after the period next the word "Convention," at end of seventh line thereof, these words: The assessments for the Episcopal and the Contingent Fund shall be separate and distinct, one for the support of the Bishop and the other for the current expenses of the Diocese.

2. Amend the same chapter, Canon and section by inserting immediately after the last foregoing amendment the following: The Finance Committee shall make these assessments, upon each Parish or organized Mission, at an amount not exceeding 70 nor less than 60 cents on each communicant for the Episcopal Fund, and at an amount not exceeding 50 nor less than 40 cents upon each communicant for the Contingent Fund; the number of communicants to be reckoned by the Journal of the last preceding Convention.

3. Amend Chapter I, Canon XII, Section 1, by inserting immediately after the period next the word "purpose," in the fourth line thereof, these words: And in addition to such salary all the traveling expenses of the Bishop in the performance of his official duties shall be paid by the Treasurer out of the Contingent Fund.

All of which we respectfully submit.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee met for organization on the 6th of September, 1894, when the Rev. M. M. Marshall, D.D., was elected President and the Rev. Robt. B. Sutton, D.D., Secretary of the Committee.

At this meeting, also, the request in due form from the Diocese of Iowa for permission to elect an Assistant Bishop on the ground of extent of territory was presented, and the papers in the premises being found to be in Canonical form, the request was granted.

At this meeting, also, the Rev. James D. Miller, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood.

February 27, 1895. The consent of the Committee was given to the consecration of the Rev. John Hazen White, D.D., Bishop-elect of the Diocese of Indiana, and Samuel A. B. Trott, since deceased, was recommended to be ordered Deacon.

April 22, 1895. William Ashton Thompson was recommended to be received as a Candidate for Holy Orders, and the President of the Committee was requested to prepare and present the report of its proceedings for the past year to the approaching Diocesan Convention, to be held in Grace Church, Morganton, on the 15th proximo.

May 9, 1895. The Committee recommended the Rev. George Valerie Gilreath, Deacon, for ordination to the Priesthood, and, at the request of the Bishop, that the time required to elapse before such ordination be shortened by the space of one day.

Resolved, That it is advisable to request the General Convention to set apart the western part of the Diocese of North Carolina as a Missionary Jurisdiction.

Resolved, That the line of division for the proposed Jurisdiction be the eastern boundary of the counties of Alleghany, Wilkes, Alexander, Catawba, Lincoln and Gaston.

On motion of Dr. Marshall, the report was made the Order of the Day for Friday morning at 10 o'clock.

Mr. Chas. E. Johnson presented by request the following statement, and offered the appended resolution, which was adopted:

To the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina:

In accordance with action taken at the Convention held in Winston in May, 1894, the Trustees of the Diocese have purchased an Episcopal Residence in the city of Raleigh, and the Bishop of the Diocese has taken up his residence there.

In view of this fact, the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the Church of the Good Shepherd in Raleigh, have, by unanimous action, approved by the consent of the congregation, offered to the Bishop their Church to be his Cathedral.

At a special visitation to the Parish on the 19th of September, 1894, on the occasion of an ordination, the Bishop formally accepted the offer and expressed the hope that his action would be approved and ratified by the Convention, and that this Church which he accepted as his Cathedral might become the Cathedral of the Diocese.

The Bishop announced at the same time the appointment of the following officers to serve as the Provisional Chapter of the Cathedral, and stated that other appointments would be made as occasion might require:

Dean, the Rev. I. McK. Pittenger, D.D.; Chancellor, Richard H. Battle, Esq.; Treasurer, Mr. Charles B. Root; Archdeacon for work among colored people, the Rev. William Walker; Honorary Canons, the Rev. M. M. Marshall, D.D., the Rev. F. J. Murdoch, D.D., and the Rev. Alfred H. Stubbs.

Therefore be it resolved, That this Convention approves the action of the Bishop in accepting the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, as his Cathedral, and also accepts it to be the Cathedral of the Diocese, and further directs that the Provisional Chapter appointed by him and named above be continued, with such additions as may be found expedient, and with instructions to secure a charter and constitution to be reported to the next Convention of the Diocese for its approval.

A petition from the Vestry of St. James' Church, Kittrell, for the remission of arrearages due the Episcopal and Contingent Fund prior to May 1, 1894, was presented by Mr. F. S. Spruill, and on his motion referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Rev. Churchill Satterlee, Rector of Grace Church, Morganton, presented an invitation from the Attacoa Club, of Morganton, tendering the use of their rooms to the members of the Convention. Invitations were also received from the State Hospital and the School for the Deaf and Dumb to visit those institutions. The invitations were accepted, and the Secretary was requested to convey to the authorities extending them the thanks of the Convention.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Murdoch, it was

Resolved, That this Convention ratifies the action of the Convention of 1893, recorded on page 65 of the Journal, and referred to this body by the Convention of 1894, amending the Constitution of the Diocese, Article XII, Section 1, so that the section shall read as follows: When a Bishop or Assistant Bishop is to be elected the Convention shall vote by ballot and by orders, and a concurrence of a majority of all the Clergy entitled to vote in the Convention, and of the delegates from at least twenty Parishes in union with the Convention (the said delegates voting by Parishes), shall be necessary to an election.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. H. H. Phelps and the Rev. A. B. Hunter.

The Convention was called to order by the Bishop.

The roll was called and a quorum found to be present.

The minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and approved.

The Bishop read his Annual Address. (See Appendix A).

On motion, the address was referred to the Committee on the State of the Church.

Mr. S. S. Nash presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS.

The Committee on Elections beg leave to report that they have examined the credentials submitted to them and find certificates from thirtyfive Parishes correctly signed and regular.

Certificates from five Parishes, viz.: St. Barnabas, Greensboro; Ascension, Hickory; Trinity, Statesville; St. John's, Williamsboro, and Advent, Enfield, are not signed by the Secretary of the Vestry, according to the requirements of the Canon, and the certificate from St. Stephen's, Oxford, is not signed at all.

Believing that these errors have arisen from an imperfect knowledge of this requirement, the Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the delegates named in the certificates reported as defective by the Committee on Elections be admitted to seats in the Convention. Respectfully submitted, J. A. DEAL,

The Order of the Day being called for, the Convention, on motion of the Rev. Dr. Murdoch, went into Committee of the Whole for the consideration in detail of the report presented yesterday by the Committee on Finance.

The Committee rose and the Chairman, Mr. Kemp P.

On motion, the Convention took a recess until 4 o'clock.

The Bishop of the Diocese presented the resignation of the Rev. Wm. Stanley Barrows, as Trustee of the General Theological Seminary. The resignation was accepted and the Rev. Julian E. Ingle nominated the Rev. Junius M. Horner as Trustee for the Diocese of North Carolina. There being no other nomination, the Secretary was, on motion, instructed to cast the vote of the Convention for Mr. Horner, who was thereupon declared elected.

On motion of the Rev. Alfred H. Stubbs, an application from Gethsemane Church, Bowman's Bluff, for admission into union with the Convention as an Organized Mission, was referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

Mr. R. H. Battle presented the following

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES TO HOLD PROPERTY FOR THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA.

The Trustees of the Diocese respectfully report:

That since the last Annual Convention they have received the following deeds for property for the benefit of the Church:

1. Deed from Matthew Baxter and Jane, his wife, for half an acre near the city of Asheville; dated June 9, 1894, registered in Book No. 89, p. 256, Register's office for Buncombe county, June 7, 1894.

2. Deed of James Ridout, and Margaret, his wife, for a lot in Highlands, Macon county, containing 100 feet square; dated October 22, 1894, and registered in Register's office for said county in Book DD, at p. 347, November 10, 1894.

3. Deed from the Bryson City Land and Improvement Company, for lot No. 15 in Block No. 3 on the plat of Bryson City, Swain county; dated December 10, 1894, and registered in Swain county in Book P of Deeds, p. 264, January 16, 1895.

4. Deed of exchange between W. S. Alexander and wife and Heriot Clarkson and wife, for lots 13 and 14, Block 6, in the map of Western Heights, Charlotte Township, Mecklenburg county; dated March 1, 1895, and registered in said county in Book 104, p. 232, March 25, 1895.

5. Deed from Heriot Clarkson and Mary, his wife, for said lots 13 and 14, Block 6, in Western Heights, Mecklenburg county; dated April 23, 1895, and registered in said county in Book 104, p. 355, April 25, 1895.

6. Deed from Virgil N. Bond and wife, for lot in Littleton, Halifax county, containing 5,140 square feet; dated November 1, 1894, and registered in said county in Book 108, p. 339, February 6, 1895.

7. Deed from S. S. Nash, Trustee, for a lot of about one acre in the village of Lawrence, Edgecombe county; dated May , 1895, and registered in Book 86, p. 107, in said county.

The Trustees further report that under instructions of the last Convention, and for the reasons given in their report to that Convention (pp. 24, 25, Journal 1894), they executed a deed of quit-claim for the lot conveyed to the Trustees of the Diocese by J. T. Patrick and others, May 15, 1889, in Southern Pines, Moore county, to the assignees of the bargainors in said deed.

Soon after the adjournment of the last Convention the Trustees, in pursuance of instructions given them by that Convention, proceeded to purchase from the widow and devisee of the late Bishop Theodore B. Lyman the house and most of the lot formerly owned and occupied by Bishop Lyman, in the northern part of the city of Raleigh—fronting 164 feet southward on North street and running back northward along Wilmington street, in rectangular form, 360 feet—at the price of \$9,000, of which \$2,500 was paid in cash, and notes for the residue were executed to Mrs. Lyman, by the Treasurer for the Diocese, payable in ______years, with interest, and Mrs. Lyman executed a bond to make a title in fee-simple to the Diocese when the purchase-money shall have been all paid.

This property makes an elegant Episcopal Residence, and is now occupied by the Bishop and his family.

A few years before Bishop Lyman's death a very fine life-sized portrait was made by Huntingdon, the famous artist of New York, and soon thereafter a very faithful copy of it was made, also life-size, by Mr. William G. Randall, a talented young artist, a native of the county of Burke, N. C., and a graduate of our State University. This portrait, which is an excellent likeness of Bishop Lyman, as most of us knew him, and a valuable work of art, has been presented to the Diocese by Mr. Randall, and now hangs on the wall in the Bishop's residence.

Shortly after the adjournment of the last Convention a suit was instituted in the Superior Court of Guilford county by C. A. Hamner and wife, of High Point, against the Trustees of the Diocese and the Missionary at High Point for the sum of \$1,174.68, with interest from January 1, 1892. Mrs. Hamner, acting as Treasurer of the Mission at High Point, had raised by solicitation and otherwise in High Point and other parts of the Diocese and elsewhere the sum of \$1,361.49 to build a Church at High Point. Having bought a lot and taken the deed to herself, she proceeded to build a Church, and after having expended the sum raised for that purpose expended further upon the building the said sum of \$1,174.68 of her own money, besides incurring a debt of \$275 for stained glass windows. After expending the said sum of \$1,174.68 upon the building she and her said husband conveyed the property to the Trustees of the Diocese by a deed in fee-simple with no mention of any incumbrance upon the property, the Trustees, as a matter of fact, being ignorant that there was any such debt upon it. The Trustees are satisfied that Mr. and Mrs Hamner expended their money upon the building hoping to re-imburse themselves by the same means employed in raising the \$1,361.49 first expended. They also state that they made the conveyance to the Trustees upon the advice of a clergyman and friend, and under the impression that the amount now claimed by them would be refunded or secured to them. Their deed to the Trustees was made for the expressed consideration of \$325, and was dated September 30, 1891. No demand was made on the Trustees for payment until some time after the deed was made, and without having received notice of such action being contemplated the Trustees were served with process issuing from the Superior Court of Guilford county as above mentioned. Thinking that such litigation should be avoided, if possible, they suggested to Mr. Hamner that the facts be reported to this Convention, and that in the meantime no pleadings should be filed. To this he readily agreed; and though the Trustees are informed that the suit has gone off the docket on motion of their attorney for want of pleadings, they will, of course, consent to its being re-instated if a settlement is not here effected.

So far as the legal aspect of this case is concerned the Trustees are advised that the plaintiffs in the above case have no claim against the Diocese or the property, being estopped by their own deed.

If the Convention should be disposed to consider that Mrs. Hammer has an equitable claim upon the property for the \$1,174.68 expended by her, after exhausting the funds in her hands, there is further to be considered the obligation of the Convention to protect the fund of \$1,361.49raised by Mrs. Hammer for a Church at this place. If the property is to be sold to pay the debt upon it, did not this trust fund in Mrs. Hammer's hands have a prior claim, and does it not still have such priority over *her* funds invested in the building; or shall the trust fund be absorbed so far as may be necessary—in order to satisfy Mrs. Hammer's claim? Or shall the property be sold and divided *pro rata* between Mrs. Hammer and the Trustees—the latter holding their share for the purpose of building a Church at High Point, for which the money was originally contributed?

From the nature of the property it cannot be sold for anything like its original cost.

In conclusion, the Trustees cannot too strongly emphasize their opinion that whatever may be done in this case, the Convention should do nothing to countenance the idea that local trustees or congregations can convey encumbered property to the Diocese and thereby shift upon the Convention the burden of their obligations. The Diocese has no money with which it can pay such claims, and it cannot undertake to raise money for them.

The Trustees therefore offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That a Special Committee of three persons be appointed, to whom the above claim shall be referred; and that they be requested to report to this Convention.

For a statement of the funds under the control of the Trustees they respectfully refer to the Treasurer's report to this Convention.

Randall, now resident (temporarily, it is hoped,) in Paris, France, for his generous gift of his excellent copy of Huntingdon's life-size portrait of our late Bishop Theodore B. Lyman, and that the Sccretary send a copy of this resolution to Mr. Randall.

The Secretary presented and read the following communication from the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention:

THE GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

To the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina:

In compliance with the requirements of Title III, Canon I, Section 3, of the Digest, I would hereby give particular notice that the following alteration of the Constitution of the Church is proposed, said alteration having been adopted by the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, held in the city of Baltimore, Maryland, in October, A. D. 1892, to-wit:

That to the 5th Article of the Constitution be added a clause in these words:

The General Convention may accept a cession of a part of the Territorial Jurisdiction of a Diocese, when the Bishop and Convention of such Diocese shall propose such cession, and three-fourths of the Parishes in the ceded territory, and also the same proportion of the Parishes within the remaining territory, shall consent thereto.

REPORT OF THE MANAGERS OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION.

The Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution, with sincere gratification, respectfully reports that continued and increasing prosperity marks the career of this Institution.

Contributions during the year have been remarkably liberal, and compare most favorably with those of past years, considering the great stringency in regard to money and the general depression in the business of the country.

Notwithstanding our limited means and the necessity for economy, every department of the Institution is in successful operation, and it is a matter of common observation on the part of all who visit the Institution that the work for which it was designed is being accomplished in a thorough and efficient manner.

In this connection the Board of Managers desires to place upon record its renewed appreciation and endorsement of the wise and able administration of the faithful and efficient Superintendent of the Institution.

The Board notes with pleasure and satisfaction at each visit to the Institution that evidence everywhere abounds showing that the Orphanage is yearly increasing in usefulness and efficiency, and that it has become the hope and pride of Church people in both Dioceses of North Carolina.

By aid received from the generous donation from St. John's Guild, of Raleigh, N. C., of the fund known as The Bishop Atkinson Memorial Cot Fund, valuable additions and improvements have been made to and upon the buildings of the Institution, whereby the comfort and efficiency of the Orphanage have been largely increased. Appended to and made a part of this report is the annual report of Rev. E. A. Osborne, Superintendent of the Institution, to which reference is made for details.

While much has been done to supply the demand for buildings in order to carry on the work of the Institution, there is still pressing need for the additional buildings which are specially referred to in the report of the Superintendent, and the Board earnestly appeals to Church people of both Dioceses for donations and enlarged contributions to the end that the Orphanage may not only be enabled "to hold its own," but may also be enabled to make large strides in its career of usefulness and of love.

On the Feast of St. Philip and St. James, May 1st, the Memorial Chapel of St. Mary the Virgin was consecrated by the Rt. Rev. Joseph Blount Cheshire, Jr., D.D. The request for consecration was read by the Rev. Wm. R. Wetmore, D.D., the sentence of consecration by the Rev. C. L. Hoffmann, and the consecration sermon was preached by the Rev. R. S. Barrett, D.D., of Washington, D. C. Other Clergy present were the Rev. M. M. Marshall, D.D., of Christ Church, Raleigh; the Rev. James Carmichal, D.D., of St. John's Church, Wilmington; the Rev. Wm. Walker, Archdeacon; the Rev. J. C. Davis, of All Saints' Church, Concord; the Rev. F. W. Hilliard, of St. Paul's Church, Monroe; the Rev. E. A. Osborne and the Rev. P. P. Alston, of Charlotte.

A large congregation witnessed the impressive ceremonies of consecration and the confirmation of six girls and five boys, inmates of the Institution.

This beautiful churchly Chapel was the generous gift of the Honorable William Preston Bynum to the Institution, and suitable acknowledgment has been made to him by the Board of Managers.

THE NINTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE REV. E. A. OSBORNE, SUPERINTEND-ENT OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE.

To the Board of Managers:

In making this my ninth annual report of the work of this Institution, I can but express much gratitude for the continued manifestations of the favor and protection of Divine Providence with which we have been favored during the year, for, though we have had more sickness than usual, the cases have usually been mild, and none have terminated fatally; so that we are able to say that during the eight years of our history we have had but one death among the children, and that was the result of an accident.

While we rejoice and give thanks for the mercies of the past year, we have to mention with profound sorrow the loss of one of the Board of Managers, whose presence and friendly counsel the Superintendent most deeply laments. I refer to the death of the late Captain B. H. Moore, who fell asleep on the 27th of March last. He always took a lively interest in the work of the Orphanage, and was ever ready to devote his time, energies and means to the advance of its welfare.

Though our farming operations, under the direction of Mr. Jamison, have not been as remunerative as in past years, owing, in a measure, to the entire failure of our turnip crop by heavy freezes during the winter, yet the farm and dairy department have about paid expenses, besides furnishing bountiful supplies of food and comfort for the children and the usual training for the boys.

The educational work of the Institution, under the direction of Misses Howard and Call, the latter one of our former pupils, has been kept up and proved fairly successful, while the management of the children, under the direction of Miss Mackay at Thompson Hall, and Miss Capehart at Bronson Hall, has been efficient, and the improvement of the children in point of character and general deportment, upon the whole, very encouraging. The buildings at Thompson Hall have been greatly improved by the addition of a new dining-room, and dormitory for girls on the east side, and the dormitory and Matron's room on the west end of the Main Building, the expenses of these and some other improvements, consisting of water-tank, pipes, closet and sewerage, having been paid out of the Bishop Atkinson Memorial Cot Fund of \$2,500, given by St. John's Guild, Raleigh, as directed by the Board of Managers at their meeting last year, with the exception of some fifty dollars, which covered the expense of a memorial tablet, costing \$40, placed in the new dining-room.

The circulation of the *Messenger of Hope* has increased to about two thousand subscribers, and the paper now pays its own expenses and adds something towards the support of the Institution, besides being a most important auxiliary to this and other Diocesan work. Contributions during the year have been remarkably liberal, considering the great stringency in regard to money and depression in the business of the country, showing that this work is dear to the hearts of Church people in both Dioceses.

We have received sixteen children during the year and discharged eighteen, the present number being forty-eight; of these twenty-eight were from the Diocese of North Carolina and twenty from East Carolina.

We refer to the itemized statement of contributions both of money and clothing as evidence of the interest manifested in the work by both Dioceses, which we gratefully acknowledge.

Dr. Petree has been our physician, and much gratitude is due him for his cheerful, faithful and ready response to every call made upon him during the entire year.

The Institution is also greatly indebted to the merchants and citizens of Charlotte for their generous response to every call and suggestion for aid, and for many unsolicited favors. We are also indebted to the Southern Express Company and to all the railroad companies in the State for free or reduced transportation; and also to the newspapers of Charlotte and other places in the State for free advertisements and friendly notices. The Clergy all over the State have shown unabated interest in the work. Several new guilds have been formed, which, with those already organized, and several Sunday-schools, have been very active and efficient in their aid.

I append a summary of receipts and disbursements during the year, and refer to my books for the various items of the accounts.

The most urgent wants of the Institution are an infirmary for the sick, an industrial hall for the boys, a cottage for the Foreman and a cottage for a skilled gardener. These various buildings can be erected for an outlay of from five to eight hundred dollars each, and would be a great advantage to the work. Respectfully submitted,

2. *Resolved*, That the words *of aid* be inserted after the word *amount* in Chapter I, Canon XVIII.

3. Resolved, That the words presiding officer be substituted for President in the fourth Rule of Order.

4. Resolved, That the words the Committee on Canons be inserted in the fifth Rule of Order just before the Committee on Elections, and that the word Parochial be stricken out of the sixth Rule of Order.

The Rev. Walter J. Smith presented the following

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE MISSIONARY COMMITTEE.

In making their usual annual report the Executive Missionary Committee is deeply impressed with the importance of the possibilities before us, as well as with the results of the past year's work in this department. During the past year the Committee has paid the stipends of nineteen Missionaries, eleven of whom gave their entire time to the work; the others performed parochial as well as Missionary work. Appropriations were distributed according to the means at our disposal and the work performed by the Missionary, the Diocesan Stipend in no case, excepting that of Chapel Hill, exceeding \$200 per annum. Seven Missionaries have served in the Convocation of Asheville, four in the Convocation of Salisbury, four in the Convocation of Charlotte, two in the Convocation of Raleigh, and two in the Convocation of Tarboro.

An additional appropriation was made for Weldon, but the Rev. Mr. Orpen, the Missionary, was compelled to withdraw from his field of labor shortly after the appropriation was made. In November, 1894, the Rev. Mr. Barker withdrew from the Missionary work in the Convocation of Asheville to become Rector of St. Thomas' Church, Reidsville.

In some portions of the Misionary field there have been losses, in others the work has held its own, while here and there real gain has been attained. From every side we have calls for increased effort. Many new places might be opened up if we only had the laborers necessary; yet instead of making advance, so far as territory is concerned, it might be well to relinquish part of the ground now held for the sake of bestowing more labor upon the part retained, but having put our hand to the plow in the Master's field, it will not do for us to look back; we must go forward. Moreover, the Church in doing this work is providing spiritual ministrations in the waste places into which business calls so many of her sons and daughters. And thus she is laboring to bear her testimony to the living Christ, the Savi ur of all.

The Committee is delighted to learn from the Treasurer's report that the offerings from the various congregations for the past year for Diocesan Missions amounted to \$1,469.87, and the Bishop's collections gave \$662.60, making an aggregate of \$2,132.47, a large excess over the old plan, and sufficiently vindicating and recommending the new plan as to warrant us in retaining it. We therefore earnestly recommend that a Clergyman be employed to visit the different congregations of the Diocese for the purpose of deepening the interest in the Missionary work and perfecting the plan already inaugurated.

At the May meeting of 1894 the Committee fixed the monthly salary of the Executive Secretary at \$75 for six months. Action was also taken for establishing the *Messenger of Hope* upon a more secure basis, and the sum of \$15 per month was appropriated until further notice for this purpose. The Treasurer was ordered to pay to the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, \$125 for the quarter beginning July 1st. He was also ordered to pay the Rev. W. L. Mellichampe \$25, an amount of back stipend. The Deans of the Convocations were directed to urge insurance on all Church property. At the January meeting the Rev. E. A. Osborne was elected Executive Secretary *protem*, in place of the former Secretary, the Rev. Scott B. Rathbun, who had accepted a call to Beaufort, S. C. The Deans of the Convocations and the Missionaries were requested to send to the Rev. Mr. Osborne reports of the work done in their respective fields.

Ten dollars per month for four months, beginning February 1st, was appropriated for the *Messenger of Hope* as a commendation on the part of the Committee of this paper as a great means of good throughout the Diocese.

Missionary addresses were made by the Rev. Charles Fetter, the Rev. F. W. Wey, the Rev. W. R. Wetmore, D.D., the Rev. Milnor Jones and Mr. F. S. Spruill.

On motion of Mr. R. H. Battle, it was

Resolved, That this Convention approve the recommendation of the Executive Missionary Committee that they appoint an Executive Missionary Secretary, whose duty, besides the clerical work of the Committee, shall be to promote the plan heretofore adopted for the collection of funds for the Missions of the Diocese, and to do such other Missionary work as may be required of him under the direction of the Bishop.

On motion, it was resolved to adjourn at the conclusion of the religious exercises.

Contributions were received for Diocesan Missions, prayers were offered by the Bishop, and the Convention adjourned.

THIRD DAY.

GRACE CHURCH, MORGANTON, FRIDAY, May 17, 1895.

The Convention met at 9 o'clock.

Morning Prayer and Litany were said by the Rev. Charles Ferris and the Rev. F. A. Fetter.

The Bishop took the chair and called the Convention to order.

The calling of the roll was, on motion, dispensed with.

The minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and approved.

Mr. R. H. Battle moved to refer to the next Convention the ratification of the action of the last Convention in amending Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution, as noted on pp. 47–48 of the Journal. Unanimous consent was given—32 Clergy and 15 Parishes voting.

On motion of Mr. S. S. Nash, it was unanimously

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention are due and are hereby tendered to the Rector and congregation of Grace Church, and to the citizens of Morganton generally, for their generous hospitality in the entertainment of this body, the Woman's Auxiliary, the Daughters of the King and the visitors in attendance on our sessions.

On motion of Mr. C. E. Johnson, it was

Resolved, That the expenses in attending the Convention, incurred by Clergymen who have been received into the Diocese since the last meeting of the Convention, and who have been given honorary seats in this Convention, be paid by the Treasurer.

Several applications having been made for leave of absence, it was, on motion of Mr. S. S. Nash, resolved that their consideration should be deferred until the afternoon

The Order of the Day being called for, the Rev. McNeely DuBose read the report of the Special Committee on the proposed Missionary Jurisdiction. (See page 24).

Journal of Proceedings.

A motion to postpone the consideration of the report until the next Convention did not prevail.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. DuBose, the first resolution proposed by the Committee was adopted.

Pending the discussion of the report of the Special Committee, the Rev. Junius M. Horner, by consent of the Convention, presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your Committee on the State of the Church submits the following report:

From the Parochial Reports at hand we are unable to make a summary of statistics that would be of value, and the Committee urges upon the Clergy to be more prompt in sending in their reports, that a correct idea of the work done may be laid before the Convention in session each year.

From the 105 reports received your Committee wishes to call attention to the following significant figures: There are five congregations in the Diocese giving \$1,000 or more to the support of their minister; five give from \$500 to \$1,000; seven give from \$300 to \$500; seventeen give from \$100 to \$300; forty-one give less than \$100 and thirty give nothing. From which figures it would appear that there are only ten Parishes that are giving anything like an adequate support for a Rector. Your Committee thinks it best to speak plainly on this subject.

It is expecting too much of ten Parishes, only five of which are much more than self-supporting, to carry on the extensive Missionary work in our field.

In view of these facts your Committee approves of the steps being taken to set off a part of the Diocese as a Missionary Jurisdiction.

Under the new method of collecting the Fund there seems to be an increase in the Missionary Fund of the Diocese, and we urge upon all the Clergy to adopt the method of individual monthly pledges, and we think there will be a much greater increase reported at our next Convention. Our Missionaries already in the field need the increase. The noble, self-sacrificing work they are doing cannot be too highly commended, and if the Laity of the Diocese are informed of the same we believe they will respond to any appeals for money that are reasonable. In this connection your Committee would say that in its judgment the policy to be pursued in this work should be one of concentration, so that centers with some strength may be formed. Places capable of development should receive the most attention, and Parishes should be built up that they may become self-supporting, and having become so may be in a position to aid others. Parishes as well as individuals should learn that "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

Furthermore, under this head, your Committee would call attention to the fact that the salaries of the Clergy in the Diocese of North Carolina are, on an average, lower than in any of the sister Dioceses, except one. The Clergy are at a great disadvantage in their work where the matter of bread and meat must receive so much of their anxious care.

Again we may note that Mission work does not stand alone, but is vitally connected with school work. Where the teaching function of the Church is not exercised in all its breadth and length and depth, the results of Mission work cannot but be disappointing. These things being so, your Committee, with all the emphasis it may, would call attention to the fact that the Church in this Diocese has too long neglected that most important adjunct to her Mission work.

We are glad to note the work of Dr. Murdoch in his school at Salisbury, and we call special attention to the good work of St. Mary's School for girls at Raleigh. It is in great measure due to the training received there that we see such telling work done by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese. The loving and watchful care of the Rector of this school over his girls is reflected in their loving work later in life. The Ravenscroft Training School is somewhat disappointing in the work done for the boys and young men of the Diocese. Your Committee would recommend that some kind of change be made and some efficient and commendable scheme started for a suitable training school for boys, and that this need be urgently pressed upon the authorities whose province it is to take action in this matter.

The Thompson Orphanage is doing a most excellent work, and our efficient Superintendent of the same is building an Institution that will be of the greatest credit and benefit to the Diocese, and we should, as far as possible, give towards what he denominates "the most urgent wants of the Institution": An Infirmary for the sick, an Industrial Hall for the boys, a cottage for the Foreman and a cottage for a skilled gardener.

The reports from St. Peter's Home and Hospital and from the Good Samaritan Hospital for colored people show a most loving work carried on by the good women of Charlotte.

As urged by our Bishop we cannot emphasize too greatly the work of the Woman's Auxiliary with its Junior Department. The work of the women of the Diocese could not be dispensed with; their influence is widening year by year. The Woman's Auxiliary has increased during the year from 25 branches to 30 branches, from 415 members to 477 members, and their offerings from \$1,396.34 to \$1,540.25.

The increase in the Junior Department is even more marked: From 15 branches to 37 branches, from 416 members to 675 members, and their offerings from \$598.48 to \$899.98. Would that the strong men of the Diocese would work as do these little Juniors.

The report of the Archdeacon on colored work shows a slight falling off in this work during the year, due, perhaps, to a more careful gathering of statistics. The decrease is slight in communicants, contributions and value of Church property. The seeming decrease in valuation of Church property is evidently due to a more careful estimate of the values, as it does not appear that any property has been disposed of or lost by fire.

The work of St. Augustine's School cannot be overestimated. The fruits of that work are already seen on all sides. Places are ready and waiting for all the men and women that this noble institution can send forth. Respectfully submitted, J. M. HORNER,

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On motion of the Rev. McNeely DuBose, the Deputies to the General Convention were instructed to present to that body the request of the Convention of the Diocese in regard to the proposed Missionary Jurisdiction.

Mr. R. H. Battle moved to reconsider the resolutions appended to the report of the Special Committee, presented yesterday by Mr. P. B. Means. The motion was agreed to. Mr. Battle offered the following resolutions as a substitute for the report of the Committee, and, on motion, they were adopted:

Resolved, That the matter of assessments for the Episcopal and Contingent Fund be referred to the Finance Committee, with power to act, provided that no assessment shall be laid upon any Parish or Mission without the consent of the Minister in charge or Lay Delegates present in Convention, or, failing such consent, without the consent of the Vestry of such Parish or congregation of such Mission.

Resolved, That in case any Parish or Mission shall signify to the Finance Committee its inability to pay its present assessment, such assessment shall be reduced to such sum as said Parish or Mission may agree to pay.

The Rev. Julian E. Ingle presented the following report:

The Committee appointed by the last Convention to consider and report upon the relation of certain congregations to the Convention of the Diocese, and upon the application of some of them to change their present organization, respectfully report the following facts and resolutions in regard to the cases referred to:

1. St. Mark's, Gulf, was a Parish in union with the Convention until 1882. The effect of the action of the Convention in that year with regard to it seems uncertain, but at present the congregation consists of a single family and has no ecclesiastical organization whatever.

2. St. John's, Rutherfordton, although included in the list of Parishes, has been for years without any organization.

3. St. Paul's, Goshen, has lost by death and removal almost all its communicants, and has none of the qualifications required for the maintenance of an organization.

4. Trinity Church, Statesville, in consequence of the loss of strength both numerical and financial, applies for leave to dissolve its Parochial organization and to become an organized Mission in union with the Convention. With the advice of the Clergy in charge of these Churches, and with the consent of the Bishop and of the congregations concerned, the Committee offer the following resolutions:

Resolved, that the names of St. John's, Rutherfordton, and St. Paul's, Goshen, be removed from the list of Parishes.

Resolved, That St. Mark's, Gulf, be declared by the Convention an unorganized Mission.

Resolved, That the congregation of Trinity Church, Statesville, have leave to dissolve their Parochial organization and to become an organized Mission in union with the Convention. JULIAN E. INGLE,

On motion, the resolutions were adopted.

Mr. John S. Henderson presented the following report of the Special Committee appointed to consider the case of St. Mary's Church, High Point:

The Special Committee, to whom was referred on vesterday the matter in controversy between Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Hamner and the Diocese, relating to St. Mary's Church, High Point, respectfully report that, according to the information at the command of the Committee, it appears that the Church was erected by Mr. and Mrs. Hamner from funds partly contributed by friends of the Church in and outside of the Diocese, supplemented by funds contributed and advanced by Mr. and Mrs. Hamner. It seems that the total sums contributed in response to appeals amounted to \$1,361.49, and that Mr. and Mrs. Hamner thereupon advanced some \$1,174.68 for the completion of the Church. Mrs. Hamner, after the Church was finished, stated in a printed appeal about two years ago that she had "paid out \$1,174.68 over and above the receipts," and that she "would like some liberal persons to relieve her of this burden." The Committee are of the opinion that Mr. and Mrs. Hamner have no legal claim upon the Diocese for the money advanced by them, but inasmuch as they insist that they should be re-imbursed for the amounts advanced by them, the Committee recommend to the Convention that the Trustees of the Diocese be authorized to assent to the sale of the Church property-either publicly or privately, as may be agreed between Mr. and Mrs. Hamner and the said Trustees-and that the proceeds of said sale be divided pro rata between Mr. and Mrs. Hamner and the said Trustees, and that whatever sum may be received by the Trustees of the Diocese from the proposed sale shall be held in trust for the congregation of St. Mary's Church, High Point, to be used towards the erection of a new Church.

The Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution: *Resolved*, That the foregoing report be adopted and that the Trustees of the Diocese be authorized to carry out the arrangement proposed, and that some member of this Convention shall be appointed by the Bishop to confer with Mr. and Mrs. Hammer in regard to the matter.

Respectfully submitted,

The Rev. B. S. McKenzie offered the following resolution as a substitute for that proposed by the Committee:

Resolved, That while the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina is advised by its counsel that in the suit brought against the Trustees of the Diocese by Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Hamner, of High Point, there is no lawful or equitable claim against the property in question which can be enforced by the plaintiffs; and while this Convention desires to put on record its emphatic denial of any responsibility for any debts contracted by local trustees without the knowledge and consent of the authorities of the Diocese, yet in the interest of peace and harmony the Convention is willing to accept the statement of Mr. and Mrs. Hamner that the deed made by them was made under a misapprehension, and to do what it can properly do to meet their claim. The Trustees of the Diocese are therefore instructed to consent to a decree of the Court, or to execute a deed for the settlement of the matter in controversy on the following basis:

That the lot of ground with the building thereon erected, heretofore conveyed to the Trustees of the Diocese by C. A. Hammer and wife, of High Point, be sold, and the proceeds of the sale applied –

1. To pay to the Trustees of the Diocese the sum of \$1,361.49, without interest, that being the amount which Mr. Hamner held in trust for a Church in High Point.

2. To pay to Mrs. Hamner the sum of \$1,174.68, without interest, that being the amount expended by her upon the property held in trust.

3. The balance, if any, to pay over to the Trustees of the Diocese to be held and applied by them, along with the \$1,374.68, to provide a Church for the congregation at High Point.

The substitute was not adopted, but the resolution offered by the Committee was passed, and Mr. John S. Henderson was, on motion, appointed to confer with Mr. Hamner, of High Point, and to urge his acceptance of the terms proposed by the Convention.

The Rev. McNeely DuBose presented the following

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FELLOWS OF RAVENSCROFT.

Since the last meeting of the Convention the Board has held two meetings; one regular, July 11th, and one called, on October 8th—both meetings in Asheville. At the July meeting the Rev. Wm. Stanley Barrows having removed from the Diocese, the Rev. Alfred H. Stubbs was elected Warden of Schoenberger Hall.

Mr. Ronald MacDonald resigning in September the Head Mastership of Ravenscroft School, on the 8th day of October Mr. J. H. F. Wight was elected to fill his place for one year. Ravenscroft School is very small, but we consider Mr. Wight in every way competent to make a good school, provided he receives a proper patronage.

On the 13th of February, 1895, Schoenberger Hall being vacant and in need of improvements and repairs, the Bishop, on the solicitation of the Warden and the Secretary of the Board, granted permission to rent the residence part of the Hall to Mrs. Kepler, of Trinity Parish, for one year, leaving the details of the agreement with the local members of the Board. With the approval of the Warden, the residence part of the Hall was leased to Mrs. Kepler for eight months for \$240, of which \$200 was made payable at once, to be expended in repairs and improvements, which have been made as follows:

The Hall is now thoroughly convenient and comfortable, and we believe that we were fortunate in so improving it.

McNEELY DUBOSE, Secretary of the Board.

On motion, the Convention proceeded to the election of a Treasurer. Mr. Chas. E. Johnson was nominated, and the Secretary was, on motion, instructed to cast the vote of the Convention for Mr. Johnson, who was thereupon declared elected.

The Rev. McNeely DuBose extended to the Convention an invitation to meet in Trinity Church, Asheville, on Tuesday, the 9th day of June, 1896. On motion, the invitation was accepted. The Convention then proceeded to the election of Deputies to the General Convention. The Rev. James A. Weston and Mr. C. F. McKesson were appointed Tellers of the vote for Clerical Deputies, and the Rev. J. D. Miller and Mr. E. C. Edmunds, of the vote for Lay Deputies.

The result of the election was as follows:

First ballot—Votes cast 48: of which the Rev. M. M. Marshall, D.D., received 44; the Rev. F. J. Murdoch, D.D., 37; Mr. S. S. Nash 37; Mr. R. H. Battle 35; Mr. John Wilkes 31; Mr. Silas McBee 30.

Second ballot—Votes cast 44: of which the Rev. McNeely DuBose received 23.

Third ballot—Votes cast 37: of which the Rev. Jarvis Buxton, D.D., received 21.

These persons were therefore elected.

A ballot for Supplementary Deputies resulted as follows:

Votes cast 31: of which the Rev. James A. Weston received 20; the Rev. Julian E. Ingle 19; the Rev. Junius M. Horner 18; the Rev. Bennett Smedes, D.D., 17; Mr. John S. Henderson 30; Mr. Wm. L. London 23, and were declared elected.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to cast the vote of the Convention for Mr. Fred. Philips and Mr. P. D. Walker, who were thereupon declared elected.

On motion of Mr. R. H. Battle, it was ordered that 900 copies of the Journal of the Convention be printed.

Messrs. Wm. L. London, Chas. M. Busbee, H. G. Connor, R. H. Battle and John Wilkes were nominated as Lay Members of the Executive Missionary Committee. There being no other nominations, the Secretary was, on motion of Mr. S. S. Nash, directed to cast for them the vote of the Convention, and they were declared elected.

In the same manner were elected

Resolved, That the Organized Mission of Gethsemane, Bowman's Bluff, be admitted into union with the Convention of the Diocese.

The Rev. Mr. Hunter presented and read the report of St. Augustine's School. (See Appendix B).

There being no further business before the Convention, the minutes were read and approved, and it was

Resolved, That after the usual devotions the Convention adjourn sine die.

The *Gloria in excelsis* was sung, prayers were offered and the Benediction given by the Bishop of the Diocese, and the Convention was declared adjourned.

ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP.

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

I bid you all a most hearty welcome to our annual gathering, and I most devoutly pray that God may be with us in this, as in all things, and that He may teach us that the Kingdom of Heaven is not meat and drink, but love and peace and joy in the Holy Ghost. We come not together for mere business and routine, but to look one another in the face, to refresh our spirits by mutual conference, and to gather strength and wisdom, by our communion in the love of God and of our brethren, for the work laid upon us for God and for God's world.

Thirty-one years ago our Diocesan Council, driven to the refuge of the mountains by the first blasts of war, met in the little framed church which once occupied this spot. To-day in peace and love we gather in this more spacious and seemly edifice, and we thank God that with all loss and change He mingles the blessedness of growth in power and in knowledge.

Besides the above I have officiated, in going and returning from the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of the South, and in connection with my attendance upon the House of Bishops, and upon the Missionary Boards of the Church, a number of times beyond the limits of the Diocese. June 10, 1894, I spent with the Rev. Mr. Jeffery, of Little Neck, Long Island, sometime my assistant in St. Peter's Church, Charlotte; Sunday, July 10th, at Spartanburg, S. C., with my friend the Rev. Theodore D. Bratton. October 11th, at the request of Bishop Paret, I took part in the opening services of the Convention of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, in the Church of the Epiphany, Washington City; and Sunday, October 21st, I spent in Middletown, Connecticut, and preached in Christ Church, South Middletown. I have not left the Diocese except when in my judgment my duty to the best interests of the Diocese demanded it; and I have remained at home during intervals between visitations which have hardly afforded me leisure for the performance of those duties connected with the administration of the office, quite as necessary as the duty of visiting parishes and missions. I have made my stay in the different parishes so very brief in most cases that I have seldom been able to feel that I fully understood the situation of affairs in the parish and in the field about it; and yet I am pained to report to you that there are several points which I have not visited at all since my consecration. These are mostly very small and inconsiderable chapels and missions, but I am sorry that there should be any such.

It will be seen by the foregoing summary that during the year ending April 30th I have visited and officiated in one hundred and twenty-nine congregations or places, an aggregate of two hundred and thirteen times; I have administered the Holy Communion ninety-two times, preached one hundred and seventy-three sermons, made thirty-six

addresses, and confirmed four hundred and fifteen persons, within the Diocese. I have also baptized eight adults and nine infants, officiated at five funerals, and married three couples. Friday, August 10th, at Tillery, in Halifax county, I laid the corner-stone of the Chapel of the Holy Innocents, being assisted in the service by the Rev. Walter J. Smith, whose faithful endeavors, aided by the liberality of Mrs. Frieze, of New York, and the North Carolina Lumber Company, of Tillery, have brought the work already nearly to completion. The next day, August 11th, at Lawrence, in Edgecombe county, assisted by the Rev. Walter J. Smith and the Rev. Charles L. Hoffmann, I laid the corner-stone of a chapel to be called "Grace Memorial Chapel," built by a lady of Tarborough in memory of a very beautiful and noble young Christian life taken from this world to a place more meet for it. This hopeful mission at Lawrence, now supplied with a suitable house of worship, has been the work of a few of the faithful laymen and women of Calvary Church, Tarboro. Their zeal and taste have so adorned this most admirable structure that there are few chapels in the Diocese so pleasing and so well adapted for the reverent performance of the public services of the Church.

September 2d, the Fifteenth Sunday after Trinity, I consecrated the new church recently erected to replace the one destroyed by fire, for the Mission of the Good Shepherd, Cashier's Valley. The Petition for Consecration was read by Mr. David T. Johnson, and the Sentence of Consecration by the Rev. John A. Deal, missionary in charge. I preached the sermon. The Rev. Samuel Rhodes was also present assisting in the service, and the Rev. F. Cecil Bayliss, of the Diocese of Florida. The chapel had been built largely by means of help rendered by various branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in this and in other Dioceses.

On the 7th of September I organized a mission at Highlands, in Macon county, to be known as the "*Church of the Incarnation*," and appointed the officers of the same, as provided in our diocesan canons. On the 27th of December, acting under the same canon, I organized a mission at Murphy, in Cherokee county, to be known as the "*Church* of the Messiah."

Our present number, therefore, is seventy-one Priests and Deacons, a gain of four over last year.

Several whose names appear, however, are not actually residents in the Diocese. The Rev. William S. Barrows has a fellowship in the General Theological Seminary, but desires to retain his canonical connection with this Diocese. I have thought that his case comes within the meaning of the canon allowing non-residence in the case of officers and professors in our general Church institutions. The Rev. Frederick, Towers, the Rev. Edward Benedict and the Rev. Alvin J. Vanderbogart have resigned their parishes, but have not asked for letters dimissory, as they may take other work in the Diocese. The names of the Rev. A. H. Boyle and the Rev. Henry M. Joseph also appear on our list, though neither of them has been in this Diocese for a number of years, nor have they made any report to the ecclesiastical authority, as required by the canon. I am required by the canon to report also that on the twentyseventh day of March of this current year I suspended from the exercise of his function for the term of one year from that date the Rev. George H. Bell, Presbyter of this Diocese.

Since the last Convention I have advanced two Deacons to the Priesthood: the Rev. John W. Barker, ordained in Trinity Church, Asheville, on the Seventeenth Sunday after Trinity, September 16, 1894, and the Rev. James D. Miller in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, on the Eighteenth Sunday after Trinity, September 23d.

The fields of labor of the Clergy are the same as last year, with the following changes and modifications:

The Rev. Alfred H. Stubbs has resigned the rectorship of St. Barnabas's Church, Greensboro, and has been appointed Warden of Ravenscroft Associate Mission and Training School, with general oversight of the mission stations in Buncombe county and in several neighboring counties.

The Rev. Charles L. Hoffmann has resigned the rectorship of Calvary Church, Tarboro, and has become Rector of St. Peter's Church, Charlotte.

The Rev. William S. Barrows has resigned his work in connection with the Ravenscroft Associate Missions and Training School, and is at present absent from the Diocese, as was mentioned above.

The Rev. Charles J. Wingate, in addition to his parish of St. Timothy's, Wilson, has accepted the rectorship of St. Clement's Church, Ringwood, and gives one Sunday each month to this latter parish.

The Rev. Frederick Towers has resigned the rectorship of the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill.

The Rev. Fenner S. Stickney has resigned the rectorship of St. Peter's Church, Charlotte, and has been transferred to the Diocese of Virginia.

The Rev. John W. Barker has resigned his work as missionary in Macon and Swain counties and has become rector of St. Thomas's Church, Reidsville, and of the Church of the Epiphany, Leaksville. The Rev. Edward Benedict has resigned the rectorship of St. Stephen's Church, Oxford.

The Rev. Stewart McQueen has resigned the rectorship of St. Philip's Church, Durham, and has been transferred to the Diocese of East Carolina.

The Rev. Edward P. Green has resigned the rectorship of Grace Church, Morganton, and has been transferred to the Diocese of East Carolina.

The Rev. Alvin J. Vanderbogart has resigned the rectorship of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount.

The Rev. Gaston Battle, Deacon, in addition to the mission of St. John's, Battleboro, is also serving in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount.

The Rev. Hardy H. Phelps, rector of Calvary Church, Henderson county, has at my request assumed charge of St. James's Church, Hendersonville, and St. Paul's Church, Henderson county, with a Deacon under him officiating in those churches.

The Rev. John F. Milbank has resigned the rectorship of Emmanuel Church, Warrenton, and has been transferred to the Diocese of Ohio.

The Rev. Frederick A. Fetter, Deacon, in addition to High Point and Lexington, has also been serving the mission at Germanton.

The Rev. Thomas C. Wetmore, Deacon, has been removed from Lincoln and Gaston missions and has been assigned missionary work in Henderson county under the Rev. Hardy H. Phelps.

The Rev. George V. Gilreath, Deacon, has been serving St. Saviour's Chapel, of Christ Church parish, Raleigh, and also as assistant to the Rev. Dr. Marshall.

The Rev. Frederick W. Wey, Associate Priest of Ravenscroft Mission, has been in charge of the work in Haywood, Jackson, Swain and Cherokee counties.

The Rev. Milnor Jones, Deacon, is missionary in Watauga, Ashe and Mitchell counties.

The Rev. Churchill Satterlee has become rector of Grace Church, Morganton.

The Rev. Louis H. Schubert has become rector of the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill.

The Rev. Samuel Wilson Moran has become rector of Emmanuel Church, Warrenton.

The Rev. Martin L. Poffenberger has become rector of Calvary Church, Tarborough.

The Rev. Edwin H. Green has accepted the rectorship of St. Barnabas's Church, Greensboro, but I have not yet received his letters dimissory from the Bishop of Southern Virginia.

The Rev. George A. Zellers, of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, has since the first of the current year been serving very acceptably in St. Philip's Church, Durham, under a temporary arrangement which I made with the vestry of that parish.

William Ashton Thompson, of St. Peter's Church, Charlotte, was received as a Candidate for Holy Orders April 22, 1895. Samuel A. B. Trott, a colored Candidate for Holy Orders, who had for some years been doing most faithful and laborious service as a teacher and catechist in Moore county, departed this life April —, 1894. Otherwise our list of candidates remains as it stood last year, except that several have been ordained, as has been mentioned heretofore.

Having thus completed the report of my official acts, and given the statistical information required by our general canon, I proceed, as briefly as I can, to present for your consideration some matters which seem to me especially deserving of your careful attention and vigorous action.

OUR DIOCESAN MISSIONARY WORK.

This is first in place because first in importance. The whole life and hope of the Church in North Carolina are bound up in this work. As the weak and seemingly insignificant fibrous roots which spread away furthest from the trunk really gather the nourishment by which the tree lives, so shall we in this Diocese grow and strengthen just in the measure that we push our mission enterprises beyond the limits of our larger and stronger parishes.

With our limited means of supporting missionary enterprises in this Diocese it seems to me that we should carefully lay out our work, and use our limited means in such a way as to develop as far as possible additional resources from the field worked. With this view I have endeavored during the past year to reorganize the missions in the

extreme west. I have placed the Rev. Frederick W. Wey at Waynesville and have placed under his charge the work in Haywood, Jackson (except Cashier's Valley and vicinity), Swain and Cherokee, requiring each congregation served by him to contribute a specific sum, agreed upon by themselves, towards his support. The Rev. Mr. Deal being deprived of the services of an assistant by the removal of Mr. Barker to Reidsville, I have limited him to the work in Macon county and at Cashier's Valley. Highlands and Cashier's Valley are very inconveniently situated for him, but during the summer season it is hoped that he may have assistance from visiting Clergy. At all these places the work is hopeful, and at Highlands it seems specially important. A large number of visitors resort to it during the summer, and the number of permanent residents is rapidly increasing. That which makes this a field of peculiar interest and importance, however, is the fact that there has been a good deal of activity displayed in that community by the Unitarians, and well-disposed but poorly instructed. persons are liable to be drawn away from their faith in Christ by this influence. I was very happy to see there last summer the good effects of Mr. Deal's labors, not only among the visitors, but among the people of the country and the permanent settlers in the village. He is striving most earnestly to build a church there, in which I bespeak for him the good-will and co-operation of all Christian people. In the organization of the mission of the Church of the Incarnation I trust we have made a beginning which shall soon ripen into a strong and influential congregation.

I have given much thought and labor to the work of the Ravenscroft Associate Mission and Training School. Having lost the services of the Rev. Mr. Barrows, I last July nominated to the Board of Fellows the Rev. Alfred H. Stubbs, who was thereupon elected Warden. But I find that, from causes useless to enumerate in this place, the endowment of this institution, which a few years ago yielded a thousand dollars annual revenue for the support of the work, now yields practically nothing. I have had the use of part of the building known as Shoenberger Hall, and for an income only what I could get out of the scanty appropriations of our Diocesan and Domestic Boards. I appointed as Associates of Ravenscroft Mission the Revs. Samuel Rhodes and William F. Rice, Deacons, and the Rev. Frederick W. Wey, of Waynesville, Priest. Mr. Wey has special charge of the field already mentioned, while Mr. Rice and Mr. Rhodes act under Mr. Stubbs's more immediate They serve the various chapels in Buncombe direction. county as frequently as it is possible for them to do, and also keep up services at the Hot Springs, at Brevard and at Bowman's Bluff. In connection with these places I have endeavored to apply the rule spoken of above, and to require a specific sum to be paid by each congregation towards the support of the services. In the places specified above this effort has been met with a just appreciation by the people, but in many of our missions throughout this region it seems never to have been required of the members of the Church in the several congregations to assume any part of the responsibility for the maintenance of the ministrations of the Church. It is a question whether this policy does not insure the continuance of a condition of helplessness and dependence so long as it is pursued.

In another section of the mountain country the zeal of a few of our good women, organizing the children of the Diocese into branches of the Junior Auxiliary, has enabled me to begin what I trust may prove a most important work. Miss Horner, the Diocesan Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary, last summer proposed to become responsible for six hundred dollars a year for the support of a missionary in Watauga county. I at once availed myself of this offer by engaging the Rev. Milnor Jones to proceed to Watauga, and to attempt to revive the old Mission of Valle Crucis. The present owner of the property has offered to give fifteen acres of land including the site of the old mission, and in consideration of this gift I have undertaken to put a building upon the property to be used for the purposes of our mission. Mr. Jones entered upon this work last September and has been most faithfully laboring in it ever since. He extends his ministrations into Ashe county on the one side and into Mitchell on the other, and ministers to a considerable number of Church people scattered over this extensive field. He is endeavoring to establish schools at This is a great opportunity for useful work several points. throughout this section. We have traditions of missionary enterprise and of faithful service by saintly men along

the banks of the beautiful Watauga and in the sheltered coves of its mountains, which forbid us to forsake this region. I most earnestly appeal to the Churchmen of this Diocese to aid me in sustaining this work. I need five hundred dollars for the building at Valle Crucis, and five hundred dollars for the schools which should be established in different parts of the missionary field.

I have dwelt more at length upon the work in this part of the Diocese because it is more purely missionary, and because the necessities of this part of the work will come prominently before the Convention in connection with the proposition which has been made to memorialize the General Convention in favor of erecting this portion of the Diocese into a Missionary Jurisdiction. Of this I shall speak presently. I pass on now to the missionary work of the Diocese in the more central and eastern parts. In my judgment it is in pushing our missionary efforts among the people of the central portion of the State that we have the most immediate prospect of growth and development. Here a large proportion of the population is accessible to us, and a large number are by intelligence and education prepared to appreciate those features of our public worship which distinguish us to the popular mind more than those principles of ecclesiastical polity which are the basis of our organization. Another advantage of work in this portion of the Diocese is found in the greater ability of the people to assist in the support of the missionary, so that our missionary funds will go much further in supplying ministers. A fair specimen of this kind of missionary work is found in the field lying along the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Railway, where the several small missions combined require only a small stipend from the Missionary Committee to enable them to maintain a minister, and where on all sides are most promising openings for aggressive work.

There has been a feeling among some of our people that we ought to do more for the advancement of the Church in the central and eastern parts of the Diocese. An examination of our Journals and the reports which they contain will show that for years past much the greater proportion of our efforts have been expended in the west. At the present time the Convocation of Tarboro receives only two hundred dollars a year of our missionary funds, domestic and diocesan, while few parts of the Diocese offer a more promising field for missionary enterprise.

I do not mean to lay down any policy for the Convention. I ask you, my brethren, to take these matters into consideration, and to inform yourselves as to the facts of the A resolution was adopted at our last meeting requircase. ing the missionaries of the Diocese to make statements in the Convention of their work and its promise of growth. It seems to me that this may be made a most useful feature of our meetings. Whether we make any changes in our canons, in our formal methods of business here, or of parochial machinery, is of small moment, if we do not provoke one another to an emulation in zeal and good works. If, by looking at the facts before us, the call for work, and the opportunity, we can stir up ourselves and our people to new diligence and enthusiasm and liberality, we shall make any method and any machinery serve the purpose of the living Spirit within us.

THE CONVOCATIONS IN THEIR RELATION TO MISSIONARY WORK.

The Convocations of the Diocese were designed to be a part of the missionary machinery of the Diocese. As a matter of fact they have usually had no connection with missionary work. As a consequence they have usually amounted to nothing in the practical life of the Church and Diocese, and therefore the Clergy and Laity have taken but little interest in them. I am not prepared to say how this state of things is to be changed, but I am persuaded that these local organizations might do a great deal for the creation of a more earnest missionary spirit, and for the furtherance of missionary work. The canons give the Bishop authority to call the Convocations together that he may meet with them when he begins a visitation in the Convocation. I shall avail myself of this power, and I ask all the Clergy to be ready to respond to this call when it comes to them, that we may see if it be not possible to make our Convocations play a more important part in our diocesan life.

THE PROPOSED MISSIONARY JURISDICTION.

Before the erection of the Diocese of East Carolina, when the difficulty of meeting the demands of the Diocese of

North Carolina for episcopal ministrations was becoming every year more apparent, it was a favorite plan of some of our best men to ask the General Convention to set off the western portion of the State as a Missionary Jurisdiction, whose Bishop and missionaries should be supported by our Board of Domestic Missions. A great obstacle in the path at that time was that there was no constitutional authority for such action; and though the necessities of the situation in the case of the immense States of Texas and California had led the General Convention, as it were against its own judgment, to adopt that method in those particular cases, yet the mind and conscience of the Church had not become entirely reconciled to that action; and I believe that our own wise and saintly Bishop was strongly opposed to it. Since that time, however, there has been quite a change in the mind of the Church upon this question, and it is almost certain that the current year will see the final adoption of an amendment to the Constitution of our General Convention expressly authorizing this method of providing for the necessities of our missionary field.

If, therefore, we can present a case which will demand this form of relief, doubtless the General Convention will have no difficulty in granting our petition, should the resources of our missionary treasury prove adequate to this demand.

I shall not in this place undertake to give the arguments for and against the proposal. It does seem to me that if our general authorities can be persuaded to undertake the burden of this work, and to support a Bishop and missionaries in this mountain region of our State, it will not only be a relief to this Diocese and allow us to give ourselves more effectively to the development of the work in our smaller territory, but it will give a wonderful impetus to the growth and development of the Church in the region set off. I believe an inspection of my journal for the past year will show that I have given as great a part of my time to the work of visitation as is practicable, and yet I have been able to give to all that great territory, embracing thousands of square miles and nearly thirty counties, only about nine weeks. No argument is necessary to show that the work to be done demands more time than this, and yet there is no reasonable prospect of any Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina, as at present constituted, being able to give, one year with another, more than this proportion of his time to that part of the Diocese. Much, therefore, as we should all regret the separation from our friends and brethren, we must see that the interests of God's Kingdom demand this, if the Church is prepared to undertake the work.

As the Church has seen fit to give the Bishop very great control over this matter, I have thought it right that I should suggest to the committee having this matter in hand a line by which the proposed Jurisdiction should be set off from the Diocese. In doing this I have felt that I should not consult my own feelings, but should be willing to set off sufficient territory to give the Jurisdiction some strength and importance at the beginning, and also to afford a prospect of organizing as a Diocese at no very distant day. With this view I have suggested for their consideration the easternmost line (speaking generally) of the counties of Alleghany, Wilkes, and Alexander, from the Virginia line as far as the Catawba river, and then following that river to the South Carolina line; all west of this to constitute the Missionary Jurisdiction of Asheville. This is, of course, suggested only as a basis for calculation and for the discussion of the question, and is subject in all respects to the action of this Convention. The necessary data in the way of statistics of the region proposed to be set off, as also of the remaining portion of the Diocese, with all other facts necessary to a proper understanding and an intelligent discussion of the question by the Convention, will more properly come before you in the report of the committee appointed last year.

Our charitable and educational institutions during the past year have not varied from their usual routine. Ravenscroft Associate Mission has already been spoken of. It is at present without any students, there being no means at my command for their support. The Ravenscroft School for boys has been carried on with some success as a day-school since Mr. McDonald's departure last fall. As the Warden of Ravenscroft and his only associate, who lodged in Shoenberger Hall, occupied only a small portion of the building, and as the defective construction and poor materials used already demanded repairs, I thought it wise to acquiesce in the judgment of the local Fellows, and to rent the hall as a private residence, reserving the library and sufficient accommodation for the Warden and his Deacon associate. By this means needed repairs have been made in the building, and it has been connected with the city water and sewage systems.

In this connection I would call the attention of our Clergy and people to Dr. Murdoch's school for boys at Salisbury. That is as yet only a day-school, but a little co-operation with him might develop it into the so much needed economical boarding school for boys.

Our institution for colored youth, St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, continues its good work. Though without many advantages possessed by some other similar institutions, it is a cause of great gratification to know that its work so approves itself in the character and influence of those whom it has trained. I have been very proud to point out to our Bishops, when they have inquired of me, the noble record made by our colored Clergy who are its *alumni*. I believe they are to-day the most faithful, unassuming, upright, and effective men to be found among our colored Clergy, whether in this Diocese or elsewhere. When I have made this claim for them it has never been disputed. I have been able to effect an important arrangement for the benefit of St. Augustine's with our Colored Commission, whereby it has been recognized as the school recommended by the Commission for the preliminary training of young colored men who desire to enter upon the study of theology; and they have, to aid us in this work, made us a special grant of one thousand dollars, which we have reason to hope will be continued as an annual appropriation.

In connection with our diocesan schools I cannot omit to ask your attention to the claims of the University of the South upon us. I know not what to say of it more than I have already urged time and again, but I am satisfied that we are neglecting a very great means of building up the Church in North Carolina when we fail to draw as close as possible the bonds of sympathy and of active co-operation which should unite us with that noble enterprise. The managers of the Thompson Orphanage will in their report to this Convention set forth its work and its necessities. I will only say that it continues its course of useful beneficence under the wise and generous administration of its admirable Superintendent. May I be permitted to add, though personalities should have but little place in such an address, that the Orphanage has suffered a sad loss in the death of the late Baxter H. Moore, one of the Board of Managers. Within a few days past I have had the pleasure of consecrating the chapel of the Orphanage by the name of "The Memorial Chapel of St. Mary the Virgin," erected for the Orphanage by the liberality of the Hon. William P. Bynum. I mention this, though it will be included in my next annual address, having taken place May 1st.

Looking over the whole field committed to us, I cannot refuse to see many signs of hope and of progress. Most of our strong parishes are growing daily stronger, and many of them are becoming as never before centres of all kinds of Christian activity. Much of this activity at present takes the form of the work of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, or of the Daughters of the King; but these organizations are no ways outside or beside the line of Church work. They are but the present form in which the life and hope of the Church are manifested. And the same promise of growth and power is equally to be seen in almost every missionary field where we are at all coming up to the measure of the responsibility laid upon us. The great difficulty is the difficulty of finding men to do the work. And this is not because of a scarcity of men; it is because men are not willing to take the work at the price of the hardship and uncertainty that they must face. Many of our smaller parishes and missions, even where they are combined in such a way as to give a man as much work as he can possibly attend to, are able to raise, with aid from the missionary funds, not more than five or six hundred dollars, with, or sometimes without, a house. Now many of the ablest and noblest of our Clergy know by experience that a man and his wife, and possibly a baby or two, can live on this small salary. But many men do not believe this, and have no inclination to make the trial. I do not mean to blame them. It is not for me to judge and to

condemn. But I say that such are the facts of the situation. We need at this moment men of piety, zeal, and ability, who are willing to give themselves to the work of God and to endure hardships that they may do the work. Thank God we already have such—the Diocese of North Carolina would be in a sad state if we had not!—but we want more of the same kind.

I will go a step further and say that we need men who are willing to work without money and without price. We shall never be able to do the missionary and educational and charitable work of the Church until men shall again burn with the love which is willing to give up everything for Christ and His Church. Clergymen who have families dependent on them must have a support for their families, but if single men when they enter the ministry were willing to give themselves up for two or three years for missionary work, receiving only their food and clothing, before entering upon ordinary parochial work, what a power for aggressive work would they thereby put into the hands of the Bishop! I may be hoping for too much, but I shall not cease to hope for this, and I now set it before the Clergy and Laity of North Carolina as one of the things which our work needs. There are those among us who have declared their purpose of devoting themselves to the Holy Ministry; there may be others whose heart God is now moving. I say to all such and to all others, that when they come, unburdened by domestic obligations, to serve as God's messengers, I shall hope to see them give at least the first years of their ministry, without price, and to find them willing to prepare for the responsibilities of the Priesthood by enduring hardship as good soldiers. With such material we might then make our associate missions a reality, and have a force at hand for missionary work wherever they might be most needed.

I would venture to ask the Clergy to be a little more careful of the canons of the Diocese in what may seem the routine of their work. I referred last year to the carelessness with which many of our parish Registers are kept. I must now call your attention to the very common neglect of some of our canons. The parochial reports show that a large number of the Clergy fail to comply with the canons requiring certain offerings to be taken in

their churches. It is quite possible that some of them have neglected to put into operation the system of offerings for Diocesan Missions enacted into a canon by our last Convention. Certainly no small number perform the duty of reporting their official action to the Bishop in such a way that the Bishop is at a very great loss to understand the reports. Having mentioned these things I hardly know what else to say about them. We have all of us taken a solemn oath before God and the Church to obey the canons. The ministry which we exercise we received conditioned by that promise. I feel that it is my duty to require from both Clergy and Laity an honest obedience to the laws of the Church. I am entitled to the co-operation and assistance of every one of you in this matter. I hereby appeal to each one of you and require your help in this business to the extent of seeing that from this time each one does his part herein. In connection with my visitations I shall hereafter endeavor to look into all such matters. I trust I shall find a ready co-operation on all hands in endeavoring to bring up all our parishes to the full measure of their duty. If there be useless or vexatious requirements in our canon law let such be abolished, but let us all join heartily in the performance of all duties laid upon us.

Our Missionary Clergy I would remind that I issued some months ago a circular-letter to them laying down certain methods of work and a certain scheme of offerings. I am willing to make any modifications in this which may be shown to be desirable, but I must ask them to observe the method therein recommended, except so far as I may modify or change it.

Since November 1, 1894, I have made my residence in Raleigh in the Episcopal Residence provided by the liberality and, I think, wisdom of the Diocese. Being in Raleigh, I have accepted the offer made me by the rector, wardens and vestry of the Church of the Good Shepherd in that city to make use of their parish church as my Cathedral. So far the arrangement is but little more than nominal, as there are no means at my command to carry on any of those practical works which should make the Bishop's Church the centre of diocesan activities. In time, however, we may be able to develop this part of the work.

I desire to mention also the valuable work of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese. It has not yet extended into all of our parishes and missions. I trust it may soon be found in every community where the Church has any organized existence. Among the many agencies of this over-busy age none has done such a work for the Church. I rejoice to see our Diocesan Branch growing and strengthening every year. I think that some of our best and wisest men have become of late a little apprehensive that we have pushed the matter of special organization for different kinds of work about as far as we can safely go. May I be allowed to suggest that the simple and elastic organization of the Woman's Auxiliary may afford a safeguard against this multiplication of agencies? Can it not be so arranged that the various parish societies, the Daughters of the King, the relief societies, hospital and missionary guilds, may all be brought into one general organization as departments in woman's work, all operating under the broad but simple system of our Woman's Auxiliary? I submit this to the consideration of the good women of the Diocese.

And speaking of the women of the Diocese brings me to the second of the subjects to which I wish to allude in this connection. I have been, from earliest childhood, brought up to look upon St. Mary's School, at Raleigh, as the most valuable of all our Church institutions or agencies in North Carolina. Since I have now, through the members of my own household, become a direct recipient of its benefits my appreciation of its value and importance has been only increased. I cannot too highly commend this school to the confidence of all the people of North Carolina. My residence in Raleigh, among other advantages, brings me into closer relation with this school, and with its admirable rector. It continues its good work with increasing success. I trust it may long continue the nursery of choice young womanhood, yearly sending out into all parts of the Diocese and of the country those who shall become themselves new centres of intellectual and spiritual life and light.

As gratifying evidences of the pious liberality of some of our people, I may mention that the late Mrs. Mary S. Speight, of Christ Church, Raleigh, besides generous lega-

cies to the two parishes in Raleigh, gave by her last will and testament one thousand dollars to the missionary work of the Diocese; and within the past few days I have received from one whom, as he is living, I shall not take the liberty of naming, a deed for a lot in the suburbs of one of our most important cities, upon which he is erecting a beautiful chapel, to be the centre of missionary work in its vicinity.

Fearing to take up too much of the time of the Convention, I close this my second annual address with the earnest prayer that He, who is able to do abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, may, by His Holy Spirit, guide us into all truth, and enable us to show forth His glory by accomplishing His work and thus hastening the coming of His Kingdom.

Since last Convention Rev. Mr. Miller, of Greensboro, having been ordained Priest, there was no need of continuing my official visits to St. Andrew's. I was assigned to duty by the Bishop to High Point instead, and continued to visit Lexington as previously. Circumstances and personal affliction have prevented my visiting these points as often as I had arranged to do: High Point once, when I preached and administered Holy Communion; Lexington three times, preaching and Holy Communion.

I have recently formed a congregation of colored people in Concord, which gives promise of prosperity. Within a few weeks I have baptized nine of these people, and now have a class of twelve in training for confirmation, and among these are some of the brightest young men I know.

We have failed to meet our assessments. For this we have but one plea—positive financial inability. Although we have paid since last Convention nearly \$450 on the debt, \$850 with accruing interest still stares the handful of struggling members in the face. From this fact we ask *special* consideration at the hands of the Financial Committee. So soon as we can we will willingly pay any assessment the Committee may equitably put upon us.

As will appear from the above report, the debt which had been resting upon the church from its organization has been paid within the past year. The Parish was very materially aided in this effort by the reception of a legacy of \$500 left to it by the late Mrs. Mary Shepherd Speight, which is hereby gratefully acknowledged. The payment of the debt has largely occupied the attention and engaged the activities of the Parish, but not entirely. Something has been done besides, and though many vacant spaces occur in the report this year we hope to fill some of them in the years to come.

Soon after the Diocesan Convention of 1894, when it became certain, by the purchase of a See House in Raleigh, that the Bishop of the Diocese would soon be in permanent residence in Raleigh, the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of the Church of the Good Shepherd, by unanimous action and with the consent of the congregation, tendered that church to the Bishop for his Cathedral. At a special visitation to the Parish on the 19th of September, 1894, the Bishop formally and officially accepted the church as offered, and appointed the following named persons to constitute a provisional chapter of the proposed Cathedral, viz.: the Rev. I. McK. Pittenger, D.D., Dean; Mr. R. H. Battle, Chancellor; Mr. Charles B. Root, Treasurer; the Rev. William Walker, Archdeacon; the Rev. M. M. Marshall, D.D., the Rev. F. J. Murdoch, D.D., and the Rev. A. H. Stubbs, Honorary Canons. The offices of Precentor and Canon Missioner were created but not filled.

In November of 1894 a Mission was organized in Southern Pines, to be known as a Cathedral Mission, and was placed under the care of the Dean. Services have been held with such frequency as has been possible by the Bishop, the Dean and other Clergy. There are eighteen communicants, and the Mission has contributed \$44.74 to the support of its services. It is expected that at a date not far distant the handsome chapel erected by the Rev. We have at Rutherfordton started a Sunday-school in the past year with fair results, and I hope it may be a success. The children, so far, seem to take much interest, and it tells in favor of the members present at the regular services. In some places it demands much prudence, constant effort and self-denial to get up and to maintain a Sunday-school; and yet I am sure if the work is done as it should be, out of love to God and the sincere desire for the prosperity of His Church, it will have a rich reward. I have often been told that it is no use to begin, because there are only two or three, but duty requires us to do our part, and we are suffering now for the negligence of the past.

At various points outside of Mission stations, but as subsidiary to them, I have preached eleven times. At St. Mark's, Mecklenburg, preached three times and took part in the service five times. In the Diocese of Virginia, at the request of a brother Clergyman, I preached three times and administered the Holy Communion once. Officiated at one marriage and two funerals. These last services were performed under the peculiar difficulties of a fourteen-mile ride over excessively bad roads in very rainy and cold weather.

The above report covers only, so far as services are concerned, my pastorate, which began on September 1, 1894. The financial report is for the whole year as far as I could ascertain. The Woman's Auxiliary and Little Gleaners have reported their work to the respective Diocesan Secretaries and will appear in their report. The ladies of the congregation have purchased and placed upon the altar a beautiful brass memorial cross in memory of the late Rev. Dr. Buel, who had long and faithfully ministered to them. Also a black walnut retable and hymn-board have been added.

We lost by death Mr. Joseph N. Benness, who had been for many years the Warden of the Mission, and also for some years Superintendent of the Sunday-school at Micadale. He never failed to be at his post of duty until infirmity of age and sickness compelled him to keep his bed. We have also been unfortunate in losing by removal some of the best workers and contributors, making us still more dependent upon the nursing of the Church at large.

Besides the above services I went up the Pigeon river near Springdale, thirteen miles from Waynesville, where we have three communicants. to give them a service and administer the Holy Communion; and also assisted the Dean of the Convocation of Asheville in the services during the meeting of Convocation in October, and preached twice.

The Rev. WILLIAM S. BARROWS, residing in Short Hills, New Jersey, reports as follows:

I beg to report that after April 1, 1894, I continued to discharge my duties in the Diocese of North Carolina up to and upon the Fifth Sunday after Trinity. During the summer I assisted my father, the Rev. N. Barrows, at Christ Church, Short Hills. Since September I have taken the services regularly at St. Peter's Church, Mt. Arlington, Diocese of Newark.

During the year I have baptized four adults and eight infants, and presented five persons for confirmation. My attention has been chiefly occupied, however, in connection with my duties and studies as Mayo Fellow of the General Theological Seminary.

The Rev. JOSEPH W. MURPHY reports as follows:

My work during the past year falls considerably short compared with that of the year before; but I have done what I could, and have never declined except when absolutely unable to officiate.

I have taken part in twenty-four services, have had thirty-three myself, have administered the Holy Communion eight times publicly, have baptized four infants, have married one couple, and have preached twenty-six times. This in fourteen different churches and chapels in and near Washington, in the Diocese of Maryland.

The Rev. SAMUEL RHODES reports as follows:

I herewith respectfully report that, as Deacon attached to the Ravenscroft Associate Mission, I have officiated and preached at Micadale, Waynesville, Hot Springs, Upper Beaver Dam, Lower Beaver Dam, Chunn's Cove, Candler's, Acton, Rockwood, and St. Matthias, Asheville.

Have said prayers, delivered addresses, preached, and assisted at celebrations of the Holy Communion in Trinity Church, Asheville.

Was present at the consecration of the new church in Cashier's Valley, and preached therein on three separate Sundays.

Have baptized one person and buried two children.

Have also officiated and preached in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Trinity Church and St. Luke's Church, Columbia, at St. Mark's, Charleston, and acted as chorister in the Church of the Holy Communion, Charleston, all of the Diocese of South Carolina.

Have made over 150 pastoral visits, and studied Latin and history under the direction of the Warden of Shoenberger Hall.

The Rev. FREDERICK TOWERS reports as follows:

Since resigning the charge of the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, in September last, I have had regular charge of the Church of St. John the Evangelist, Hingham, Massachusetts. I have also been attending lectures in advanced courses of study at Harvard University.

REPORTS OF THE DEANS OF CONVOCATIONS.

Dean of Tarboro.

The Convocation has met twice since last Convention, once at Warrenton and once at Tarboro. Neither of these meetings was well attended, but it is hoped that now that some of the vacant places have been supplied with Clergymen we shall hereafter have a full attendance of the Clergy and a better attendance of the Laity. If these meetings are to amount to anything the Laity will have to take a more active interest in them.

I have visited during the year the following points, viz.: Warrenton, Littleton, Gaston, Enfield, St. Mary's and Lawrence in Edgecombe county, Tarboro, St. Luke's, Rocky Mount, and Wilmington, St. Timothy's and St. Mark's. At all of these places offerings were made for Convocational work. W. J. SMITH, Dean.

The Convocation of Raleigh has met but once since the last Convention, the usual meeting in the autumn having been found impracticable.

Services were held in St. Stephen's Church, Oxford, in the month of February, but even these were interrupted by the extreme severity of the weather, so that while the Clergy were well represented, very few of the Laity ventured to attend. But it is doubtful how far our Convocations can do any effective work, under present regulations, unless the Laity can be induced to give their personal co-operation in adding their counsels to those of the Clergy, and in carrying out the plans proposed for our mutual advantage and for the extension of the Church's influence among the people of the State. Dean of Charlotte.

During the year the Convocation of Charlotte has had two meetings one at Shelby and one at Hickory.

Acting under the Canon, I have ministered at the following places, preaching ten times, holding twelve services, administering the Holy Communion five times, and baptizing three infants, to-wit: Fulton and Mocksville, Davie county (by consent of Dean of Salisbury); Huntsville, Mt. Airy, Taylorsville and Mt. Mourne. There are at these places forty communicants, who enjoy no services of the Church at the hands of regularly officiating Ministers.

At Huntsville I found two aged communicants had died since my last visit, who had received from me at that visit, for the last time, the Holy Communion. One of the Communion services above reported was for an aged lady on a bed of sickness, which she is likely never to leave. At all these points there should be, if possible, regular services. Such services would bring back to the Church many who are wandering away and would retain others likely to leave us.

While on this visitation I preached, by consent of Rectors, at Wilkesboro and at Statesville.

I was most gladly welcomed wherever I went. It was most delightful to me to see the pleasure I was giving by services. At several places the congregations were quite large. W. R. WETMORE, *Dean.*

Dean of Asheville.

During the past year the Convocation of Asheville has held two meetings—the first in Trinity Church, Asheville, in July; the second in St. Agnes, Franklin.

I have visited in different portions of the Convocation field, held services and administered the Holy Communion as opportunity offered.

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON FOR WORK AMONG COLORED PEOPLE.

To the Rt. Rev. Joseph Blount Cheshire, Jr., D.D., Bishop of North Carolina:

The retrospect of the year's work, though not without encouragement, brings with it the knowledge of how little has been accomplished compared with the work to be done.

The accompanying table will give the number, names and locations of the Missions as they now exist, with the statistics so far and as accurately as I could obtain them. This, with the several reports from the Missions, will render a statement of each unnecessary, but there are a few points which require mention.

The staff of Clergy and other workers remains the same as last year, with the exception of the loss sustained by the death of Mr. S. A. B. Trott, whose faithful work in Moore county has been before noticed. Mr. Trott died on Maundy-Thursday at St. Philip's Mission, and lies buried near the chapel. He was a diligent and faithful worker and had endeared himself to the community in which he lived. Much had been done through his unwearied exertions for the improvement and enlightenment of this very difficult field, and he had laid foundations which I devoutly hope some one of like mind may be found to build on. The reclaiming and care of destitute children was an interesting feature; but this will necessarily be abandoned for the present, and we shall try to seek homes for them in the neighboring families. I had hoped that much good might have been done at Tryon City. Since my last report a chapel has been built (though yet unfinished) at this point, through the energy and devotion of a Churchwoman of Maine, and I had secured the services of an intelligent, well equipped and earnest woman to teach a day school and have an influence upon the families. I found her well suited to the work, but from circumstances over which I had no control I was forced to send her away and allow the work to fall into other hands. How it has since fared I have not the means of knowing.

The Mission at Morganton, since the withdrawal of Mr. McDuffey, has not made the progress that the opportunities seem to demand, but the present Rector of Grace Church is deeply interested in the work and has been of great assistance. Much is due to the energy and perseverance of Captain and Mrs. Gordon, who have kept up the Sundayschool, and the day school, taught by Mrs. Florence Wilson, has been of great service. A colored Deacon is much needed at this point, who would be able, on the foundations already laid, to build up an enduring work. This we hope may be done very soon.

Mr. McDuffey has been steadily progressing at Asheville, and is encouraged to hope that the new St. Matthias' Church, of which the cornerstone was laid last year, as already reported, may be put up and enclosed the coming summer. The brick is purchased and on the site, and as soon as sufficient money is on hand to complete the exterior, work will be begun. The day school has been very full during the session about to close, and emphasizes the necessity of larger accommodations. The outlook is more hopeful than ever before, due to the judicious management of the Priest in Charge. Mr. McDuffey is laying foundations deep and strong which, it is hoped, will bear works of great usefulness.

The Mission at Franklin, under the charge of Mr. Kennedy, has been steadily going on its way of usefulness, and the industrial work there begun promises to be not only of benefit to the pupils, but a source of income. Mr. Deal, in providing for this Mission so largely, has done a good work and laid a foundation for the time to come.

The Mission at Charlotte, under the guidance of its faithful Priest, the Rev. P. P. Alston, is making steady progress, but he is convinced of the necessity now presenting itself for a more extended and higher grade of instruction, and is satisfied that if we do not seize the opportunity others will slip in to do the work which we are better able to accomplish. To this end he pleads for more means to develop his already efficient school, and make it one of a higher grade. A movement is now on foot to finish St. Michael's Chapel, and we hope it may be speedily successful. This chapel has for some years remained in an unfinished state, and it is now necessary that an effort should be made for its completion.

Miss Caison, who has with heroic devotion maintained a day school at Lenoir, reports encouraging results and feels hopeful for the future. They should have some provision for regular ministrations, which as yet we have been unable to furnish.

The work at Durham was of such an unpromising nature that, with the consent of the Bishop, the teacher of the day school was removed to Pittsboro. While we had no property at Durham, and were obliged to rent a very small and inconvenient room, we had at Pittsboro a school-house which was unused, and we thought best to utilize it. We hope to revive the work in Durham in the near future with better prospect of success.

At Tarboro Mr. Perry has been faithfully carrying on his work. His people have been doing much to help themselves, and are about to complete the tower of their beautiful church. Mr. and Mrs. Perry are both active workers, and Mrs. Perry has laboured as a teacher in the school without remuneration. The Mission at Wilson is under Mr. Perry's charge, and Mr. John Clark is the Lay Reader and schoolmaster. The school has gone on during the last year with good attendance, but they are much subject to changes and have lost many by removal. The communicant list has been reduced from this cause. They are severely handicapped by the want of a school building, which now they are obliged to rent.

The good influence of these older schools at Tarboro, Charlotte and Asheville is felt throughout the community, and shows the benefit of persistent work and conscientious adherence to duty.

The newer work at Louisburg, Warrenton and Littleton has been prosecuted with some success. At Littleton a school chapel has been built since the last report, and we hope to complete the interior this summer. A very successful school has been carried on here with a roll of upwards of ninety scholars by the zeal of Mr. Virgil Bond, and if it can be maintained another year its permanency will be assured. Mr. Delany has kept his appointments at Louisburg and Warrenton, once a month at each place, and reports much interest. At Warrenton a day school has been maintained the past season by the people themselves without any aid. This has been more than they could well bear, and I fear they must abandon it if they do not get help. For this reason I have recommended a grant to them. They deserve it, for they have helped themselves. They are reducing their debt by their own exertions, and have shown a faithfulness which is deserving of praise.

The little congregation at St. Luke's, in Warren county, to which I have ministered, are unabated in their interest and devotion. There are but a few of them, but new families are growing up, and the interest in the children will strengthen the older ones. I go there once a month. They have a poor little chapel which needs completing in the interior, and to be made more worthy of its purpose. They are anxious to do this, but have not the means.

At Lockville a school and Sunday-school have been carried on by Mr. Albert Council, and I have held service several times and preached.

Lincolnton, under Mr. Alston's charge as yet, is a place of importance, and still needs a school to build up the Mission.

St. Augustine's School, which has prosecuted its work with greater efficiency than ever during the past year, is becoming a centre of influence, and the improvement due to its cultivation is demanding attention. The report of the Principal will render unnecessary any words of mine.

The report of the Hospital of the Good Samaritan in Charlotte will show a valuable work accomplished, and the need there is of help for this noble charity. This completes a rapid survey of this work in the Diocese, and of what we are attempting toward the evangelization of about one-third of our population. It is lamentably small, and yet we have the greatest opportunity for Missionary work ever presented to any people. When every Parish in the Diocese will awake to its obligation toward all the souls within its reach; when they shall have realized the purpose for which the Church exists, we shall have help to carry on this work. It is for the *interest* of every citizen that it should be carried on—to put it on no higher ground. When we shall have begun to turn our attention to that almost ignored commandment, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself," we shall do well enough.

I append a tabular statement of the work.

REPORT OF THE WARDEN OF RAVENSCROFT.

I herewith respectfully report that, as Warden of Ravenscroft Associate Mission and Training School, and Shoenberger Hall, I have officiated, preached and administered the Holy Communion at Micadale, Waynesville, Hot Springs, Upper Beaver Dam, Lower Beaver Dam, Bowman's Bluff, Brevard, Saluda, Rockwood, and St. Andrew's, Buncombe county, and have provided for services at Chunn's Cove, Acton, Candler's and Leicester. Have had the direction of three Deacons and five Lay Readers, who are on duty every Sunday.

St. Luke's Church, Chunn's Cove, and St. Titus' Church, Upper Beaver Dam, have been built this year, are both in use, and await further funds for entire completion.

Have given instruction to two Deacons, examined three for ordination, and been present at the Ordering of two Priests and two Deacons.

Have cared for the welfare of Shoenberger Hall and the Atkinson and Ravenscroft libraries, which are in good condition and in constant use.

Have also frequently assisted the Rector of Trinity, Asheville, to whom I am deeply indebted for valuable assistance, and to his congregation also, which has most generously aided in the Mission work at Chunn's Cove.

Brevard needs a resident Priest, as it will shortly be reached by railway, and other organized centres thus equipped will make Missionary work here far more practical and effective, as is apparent from that accomplished at Waynesville.

All my official acts of baptism, marriage and burial are included in the Parochial reports of the Parishes and Missions wherein they were performed. Respectfully submitted, ALFRED H. STUBBS,

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF ST. AUGUSTINE'S SCHOOL.

During the past year there have been 11 teachers and 180 students, who, with those in the Primary Department, make a total attendance of 220.

At the suggestion of the Church Commission for Work among Colored People, the Theological Department of the school has been given up, and by their help another teacher has been provided for the Collegiate Department, so that our young colored men looking forward to the Holy Ministry may be better prepared to enter King Hall, the theological school established by the Commission in Washington, D. C.

The school is aided in carrying on its Missionary work by an appropriation from the Commission, as well as by other offerings of the Church, and an effort has been made to train the students not only to appreciate these gifts, but to begin themselves to make offerings, small as they may be, for the Missionary work of the Church. There are monthly meetings of the Junior Auxiliary at which papers are read by the students, concerning the different fields of Missionary work. At noon each day the school exercises are stopped by the ringing of the school bell, and each class, led by its teacher, offers a prayer for Missions.

The school has recently been visited by the Rt. Rev. C. C. Penick, D.D., General Agent of the Colored Commission.

The attendance of students has been increasingly steadier, and most of the students who began the school year in September have remained to its close in May.

Two new rooms were fitted up last summer as dormitories so as to increase the accommodations for students. A hot-air engine has been provided for our water-supply. A tank has been placed on top of the girls' building and pipes and hose introduced for protection against fire. Water has also been introduced into the laundry.

At the last visitation of the Bishop to St. Augustine's Church, Raleigh, sixteen of our students were presented for confirmation. Preparations have already been made for a new chapel. We have over \$1,300 in bank for this purpose, and it is hoped that we may be able to build it of rock found on our own land. A. B. HUNTER,

NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF ST. PETER'S HOME AND HOSPITAL, CHARLOTTE, N. C., 1894.

The year 1894 has been a busy one at the Hospital. With a large number of patients to care for and extra expenses to meet, it has been difficult to maintain it properly. We feel that each year we make advances, but we are so hampered by want of money that we cannot make improvements as we wish, and put the Hospital on the proper plane of efficiency. The greatest drawback is want of room. An operating-room is needed, and rooms for pay patients and nurses, so that the present building can be used as a free ward.

During 1894 the Hospital had 75 patients-42 males, 33 females, for a total of 1,704 days. Five deaths occurred-3 males, 2 females. Six patients were carried over to the new year.

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GOOD SAMARITAN HOS-PITAL FOR COLORED PEOPLE, CHARLOTTE, N. C., 1894.

In 1894 the Good Samaritan Hospital has cared for 52 patients—26 males, 26 females, for a total number of 1,250 sick days. Nine have died—4 males, 5 females. Seven were buried in the Hospital lot in Pinewood Cemetery. Five patients were carried over to the next year. Thirty patients were from Charlotte, 9 from Mecklenburg county, 11 from other parts of North Carolina, 2 from South Carolina.

The physicians all give high praise to the Hospital for the care and comfort given to the sick, the cleanliness and good order maintained. Many patients are brought in the last stages of disease, and are consequently a heavy burden on the Hospital, and greatly increase the deathrate.

Ten boxes and barrels of clothing and other comforts have been received from as many branches of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, which have been very helpful. Donations in food and other necessaries were also given.



APPENDIX D.

AMENDMENTS ADOPTED AND RATIFIED BY THE CONVENTION OF 1895.

CONSTITUTION, Article XII, Section 1, to read as follows:

When a Bishop or Assistant Bishop is to be elected, the Convention shall vote by ballot and by Orders; and a concurrence of a majority of all the Clergy entitled to vote in the Convention, and of the delegates from at least twenty Parishes in union with the Convention (the said delegates voting by Parishes), shall be necessary to an election.

CANON XVIII, Chapter I:

Insert the words of aid after amount in the fourth line.

Rules of Order:

- IV. For the word President substitute Presiding Officer.
- V. Insert as a second title The Committee on Canons.
- VI. Omit the word Parochial.
